

2016 Annual Town Meeting Warrant Town of Shutesbury Commonwealth of Massachusetts

May 7, 2016

To one of the Constables of the Town of Shutesbury in the County of Franklin, Greetings:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet at **9:00** a.m. on Saturday the **seventh** day of May, at the Shutesbury Elementary School at 23 West Pelham Road in said Shutesbury, in the year Two Thousand and Sixteen, then and there to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to amend the number of members on the Shutesbury Council on Aging from five citizens to seven citizens appointed for a term of three years. The Shutesbury Council on Aging was established by the Town October 30, 1973, under the provisions of the General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 8B.

(Sponsor: Council on Aging) Requires majority vote

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept and approve the following resolution regarding the critical need for immediate action on fiber optic broadband service, as written below,

Whereas broadband service to our rural towns is critical infrastructure for economic survival;

Whereas our students' education is compromised by their inability to perform an increasing number of required online assignments; and

Whereas our residents are unable to utilize digital internet health care; and

Whereas broadband assures the interconnectivity essential to life in the 21st century; and

Whereas The Massachusetts legislature passed and the governor signed Bill H4355, an Act financing information technology equipment and related projects, on June 6, 2014, which authorized \$50 Million to the Massachusetts Broadband Incentive Fund for the purpose of providing broadband internet service to the unserved towns of western Massachusetts; and

Whereas in February 2015 the new Baker-Polito Administration affirmed its support for the bond bill and said that: "Providing high-speed broadband access to all cities and towns is not only a matter of basic fairness, but it is an essential part of building stronger communities and a stronger economy"; and

Whereas on May 2, 2015 Shutesbury Annual Town Meeting, by a vote of 417 to 12, appropriated and authorized borrowing for \$1,693,200 for two-thirds of the costs for construction of a fiber optic network; and

Whereas on June 10, 2015 the voters of Shutesbury by a 92% favorable vote authorized a debt exclusion override for the fiber optic network; and

Whereas by August 1, 2015 over 52% of all the households in the Town of Shutesbury had signed up for service from WiredWest and made a \$49 deposit;

Whereas on August 4, 2015 the then Director of the Massachusetts Broadband Institute informed the Town of Shutesbury Selectboard that we had taken the necessary steps to begin construction of the fiber optic network; that the pole survey and design and engineering would begin in the next eight to nine weeks; that make ready work would begin in spring of 2016; and that construction would begin in the fall of 2016; and

Whereas little or no progress has been made on any of the steps needed to build the network;

THEREFORE be it resolved that we, the Citizens of the Town of Shutesbury in Town Meeting Assembled call upon the Baker/Polito Administration to commit all necessary resources to ensure the provision of fiber optic broadband service to all residents of Shutesbury; and

Expeditiously provide resolution to this most challenging situation by allocating the funds necessary to bring this project to conclusion; and

Instruct the Massachusetts Broadband Institute to work cooperatively with the towns and their agencies, including WiredWest, and to accept input and policy direction from the towns to jointly produce an immediate actionable plan that is acceptable to our town by June 30th, 2016.

Be it further resolved that the Town Clerk be directed to send copies of this resolution to Governor Charlie Baker, Lt. Governor Karyn Polito, State Representative Steve Kulik, State Senator Stan Rosenberg and Secretary Jay Ash, or take any action related thereto.

Road, Shutesbury, shown as Assessor's Book 1032, Page 390 - Lot ZG2, for a term of not more than 25 years, and on such other terms and conditions and for such consideration as the Board of Selectmen deems appropriate or take any other action relative thereto. (**Sponsor: Select Board) Finance Committee Recommends Requires majority vote**

Article 7. To hear, and receive reports of town officers, committees, and boards. **(Sponsor: Select Board)**

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Amherst Pelham Regional School District Agreement such that, notwithstanding Section VI, for Fiscal Year 2017 only, 10% of the operating budget assessment shall be allocated to each town based on proportionate shares of taxable property values and the other 90% will be allocated to the member towns in accordance with the per-pupil method found in the Amherst Pelham Regional School District Agreement.

operations, capital, salaries and school expenses of \$6,155,690.00 by raising the sum of \$6,135,255.00 and transferring \$20,435.00 from the Septic Betterment Fund, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, or take any other action relative thereto.

We the Planning Board of the Town of Shutesbury hereby submit to the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Shutesbury the following article for the Warrant of the 2016 Annual Town Meeting:

PROPOSED ZONING BYLAW CHANGES FOR GROUND-MOUNTED SOLAR ELECTRIC INSTALLATIONS

To see if the Town of Shutesbury will vote to amend the TOWN OF SHUTESBURY ZONING BYLAWS:

- by adding to Article VIII, Supplementary Regulations, a new Section 8.9, Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations; and
- by amending Section 13.2, Definitions, to include new definitions as written below;
- by amending Section 3-1.1, Use Table, to include a new Use Category, "Energy and Utilities"; to add two uses -- Small Scale Ground Mounted Solar Electric Installation and Large-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation; and to move two existing uses Small Wind Energy Systems and Public Utility Facility -- from the Business Use category to the Energy and Utilities category; and
- or take any other action relative thereto.

ADD THE FOLLOWING NEW USE CATEGORY AND USES TO SECTION 3-1.1 USE TABLE:

ADD THE FOLLOWING TO ARTICLE VIII- SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS:

SECTION 8.9 GROUND-MOUNTED SOLAR ELECTRIC INSTALLATIONS

8.9-1 Purposes.

Purpose. The purpose of this bylaw is to facilitate and appropriately regulate the creation of Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations by providing standards for the placement, design, construction, operation, monitoring, modification and removal of such installations that address public safety, minimize impacts on environmental, scenic, natural, and historic resources and to provide adequate financial assurance for the eventual decommissioning of such installations.

8.9-2 Applicability.

This Section 8.9 applies to Large- Scale and Small-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations, as noted. Small-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations which are accessory to an existing residential or non-residential use which generate electricity principally used by such residential or non-residential use are permitted as of right, do not need to comply with this section, but require a Site Plan Review from the Zoning Board of Appeals, as well as a building permit, and must comply with all other applicable provisions of the Town of Shutesbury Zoning Bylaw.

This section also pertains to physical modifications that materially alter the type, configuration, or size of Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations or related equipment.

The Planning Board may waive or reduce any requirement of this section upon findings of: 1) special circumstances of the site or proposal; or 2) the objectives of this section may be met in alternative manner; and 3) that such a waiver or reduction will not derogate from the purposes or intent of this Zoning Bylaw.

This section 8.9 shall not apply to any special permit duly applied for and in process prior to its effective date.

8.9-3 General Requirements.

A. Compliance with Laws, Bylaws, and Regulations

The construction and operation of all Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall be consistent with all applicable local, state and federal requirements, including but not limited to all applicable safety, construction, electrical, and communications requirements. All buildings and fixtures forming part thereof shall be constructed in accordance with the Massachusetts State Building Code.

B. Mitigation for Loss of Carbon Sequestration and Forest Habitat
If forestland is proposed to be converted to a Ground-Mounted Solar Installation the plans shall

designate thereon an area of unprotected (meaning not subject to c. 184, § 31-33 at time of application) land on the same lot and of a size equal to four times (4X) the total area of such installation. Such designated land shall remain in substantially its natural condition without alteration, including unauthorized (by SPGA) forestry/tree cutting, until such time as the installation is decommissioned. The special permit may be conditioned to effectuate and make enforceable this requirement.

C. Mitigation for Loss of Forest Habitat within the Installation

If forestland is proposed to be converted to a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation the plans shall show mitigation measures that create a wildflower meadow habitat within and immediately around the Solar Electric System and a successional forest habitat in the surrounding areas managed to prevent shading until such time as the installation is decommissioned. The special permit may be conditioned to effectuate and make enforceable this requirement.

D. Mitigation for Installation of Perimeter Fencing

Any perimeter fencing within winter sight of a public roadway, driveway, or dwelling existing at the time of the special permit application shall be entirely black in color. The special permit may be conditioned to effectuate and make enforceable this requirement.

E. Mitigation for Disruption of Trail Networks

If existing trail networks or woods roads are disrupted by the location of the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation the plans shall show alternative trail alignments to be constructed by the applicant. The special permit may be conditioned to effectuate and make enforceable this requirement, although no rights of public access may be established hereunder.

F. All plans and maps shall be prepared, stamped and signed by a Professional Civil Engineer licensed to practice in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

8.9-4 Required Documents.

The project applicant shall provide the following documents in addition to or in coordination with those required under Article IX.

A. Site Plan. A Site Plan additionally showing:

- 1. Locations of wetlands and Priority Habitat Areas as defined by the Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program (NHESP).
- 2. Locations of local or National Historic Districts.
- 3. Locations of all known, mapped or suspected Native American archaeological sites or sites of Native American ceremonial activity. Identification of such sites shall be based on responses, if any, to written inquiries with a requirement to respond within 35 days, to the following parties: all federally or state recognized Tribal Historic Preservation Officers with any cultural or land affiliation to the Shutesbury area; the Massachusetts State Historical Preservation Officer; tribes or associations of tribes not recognized by the federal or state government with any cultural or land affiliation to the Shutesbury area; and the Shutesbury Historical Commission. Such inquiries shall serve as a notice to the aforesaid parties and shall contain a plan of the project, specific identification of the

location of the project, and a statement that permitting for the project is forthcoming. Accompanying the site plan shall be a report documenting such inquiries, the responses from the parties, a description of the characteristics, including photographs, of any Native American sites located, and the outcomes of any additional inquires made based on information obtained from or recommendations made by the aforesaid parties. A failure of parties to respond within 35 days shall allow the applicant to submit the site plans.

- 4. The project proponent must submit a full report of all materials to be used, including but not limited to the use of cleaning products, paints or coatings, hydro-seeding, fertilizers, and soil additives. When available, Material Safety Data Sheets will be provided.
- B. Blueprints. Blueprints or drawings of the installation signed by a Professional Engineer licensed to practice in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, showing:
 - 1. The proposed layout of the system and any potential shading from nearby structures.
 - 2. One or three line electrical diagram detailing the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation, associated components, and electrical interconnection methods, with all Massachusetts and National Electrical Code compliant disconnects and overcurrent devices.
- C. General Documentation. The following information shall also be provided:
 - 1. A list of any hazardous materials proposed to be located on the site in excess of household quantities and a plan to prevent their release to the environment as appropriate.
 - 2. Name, address, and contact information for proposed system installer.
 - 3. The name, contact information and signature of any agents representing the project applicant.
- D. Site Control. The project applicant shall submit documentation of actual or prospective access and control of the project site sufficient to allow for construction and operation of the proposed Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation.
- E. Operation and Maintenance Plan. The project applicant shall submit a plan for the operation and maintenance of the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation, which shall include measures for maintaining safe access to the installation, stormwater management (consistent with DEP's and where appropriate Shutesbury's stormwater regulations and vegetation controls), as well as general procedures for operational maintenance of the installation.
- F. Financial Surety. Applicants for Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall provide a form of surety, either through an escrow account, bond or otherwise, accessible to the Town of Shutesbury to cover the cost of removal in the event the Town must remove the installation and remediate the site to its natural preexisting condition, in an amount and form determined to be reasonable by the Special Permit Granting Authority, but in no event to exceed more than 125 percent of the cost of removal and compliance with the additional requirements set forth herein. The project applicant shall submit a fully inclusive estimate of the costs associated with removal, prepared by a qualified engineer. The amount shall include a mechanism for calculating increased removal costs due to inflation.

G. Utility Notification. No Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall be constructed until evidence has been provided to the Planning Board that the utility company that operates the electrical grid where the installation is to be located has approved the solar electric installation owner or operator's intent to install an interconnected customer-owned generator and that the utility can and will connect the proposed generator into their power grid. Off-grid systems shall be exempt from this requirement.

H. Proof of Liability Insurance.

8.9-5 Dimensional Requirements.

Minimum setbacks for all Large-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall be:.

Front street setback: 500 feet (as required for Forest Conservation District)

Property line setback: 100 feet

Minimum setbacks for all Small-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall be:

Front street setback: 100 feet Property line setback: 50 feet

Required setback areas shall not be counted toward a facility's total acreage.

8.9-6 Design and Performance Standards.

A. Lighting.

Large- and Small-Scale Solar Electric Installations shall have no permanently-affixed exterior lighting.

B. Signage.

Sufficient signage shall be provided to identify the owner of the facility and provide a 24-hour emergency contact phone number. Signage at the perimeter warning pedestrians is allowable. Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall not be used for displaying any advertising except for reasonable identification of the manufacturer or operator of such installation.

C. Control of Vegetation.

Herbicides or pesticides may not be used to control vegetation or animals at a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation.

D. Visual Impacts

Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall be designed to minimize visual impacts including preserving natural vegetation to the maximum extent possible, blending in equipment with the surroundings, and adding vegetative buffers to provide an effective visual barrier from adjacent roads and driveways, and to screen abutting residential dwellings. When possible, a diversity of plant species shall be used, with a preference for species native to New England. Use of exotic plants, as identified by the most recent copy of the "Massachusetts Prohibited Plant

List" maintained by the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, is prohibited. If deemed necessary by the Planning Board, the depth of the vegetative screen shall be 30 feet and will be composed of native trees and shrubs staggered for height and density that shall be properly maintained. The owner/operator shall not remove any naturally occurring vegetation such as trees and shrubs unless it adversely affects the performance and operation of the solar installation. Landscaping shall be maintained and replaced as necessary by the owner/operator of the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation.

E. Utility Connections.

Electrical transformers, wires, or other utility interconnections shall be constructed as required by the utility provider and may be above ground if necessary; provided, however, that every reasonable effort shall be made to place all utility connections underground, depending on appropriate soil conditions and topography of the site and any requirements of the utility provider.

F. All electric power generated at a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall be from Solar Energy.

G. Access Driveways

Access driveways shall be constructed to minimize grading, removal of stone walls or roadside trees and minimize impacts to environmental or historic resources.

8.9-7 Safety and Environmental Standards.

A. Emergency Services

Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations owner or operator shall provide a copy of the project summary, electrical schematic, and site plan to the Shutesbury Fire Chief. The owner or operator shall cooperate with local emergency services to develop an emergency response plan. All means of shutting down the solar electric installation shall be clearly marked. The owner or operator shall identify a responsible person for public inquiries throughout the life of the installation.

B. Land Clearing, Soil Erosion and Land Impacts

The facility shall be designed to minimize impacts to open agricultural land and fields, even if not in production. Clearing of natural vegetation shall be limited to what is necessary for the construction, operation and maintenance of the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation. In no event shall tree stocking on the parcel to be developed for the installation be reduced to below Level-C as defined in 304 CMR 11.03 and as measured at the time of application. Grading that substantially disturbs the existing soil profile and structure is prohibited; sites shall be selected where construction may be accomplished without such earth work.

Prior to any site disturbance and construction, the limits of the work shown on the approved site plan shall be surveyed and clearly marked by a Professional Land Surveyor. Upon completion of the survey, the Professional Land Surveyor shall verify to the Planning Board, in writing, that the limit of work, as shown on the approved site plans, has been established on site.

The design shall minimize the use of concrete and other impervious materials to the maximum extent possible. Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall be installed on water permeable surfaces.

Locating Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations, including access driveways and any associated drainage infrastructure on original grades in excess of 15% is prohibited.

C. Habitat Impacts

Large-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installations shall not be located on permanently protected land subject to the sections 31-33 of chapter 184 of the General Laws, Priority Habitat and Bio Map 2 Critical Natural Landscape Core Habitat mapped by the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) and "Important Wildlife Habitat" mapped by the DEP.

D. Wetlands

Where wetland delineation is in doubt or dispute, the Planning Board may require the applicant to submit a request for determination of wetlands to the Conservation Commission. The Planning Board may impose conditions to contain and control stormwater runoff that might negatively impact identified wetlands or other hydrologic features even if the proposed work area is outside the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission.

8.9-8 Monitoring, Maintenance and Reporting.

A. Solar Electric Installation Conditions

The Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation owner or operator shall maintain the facility in good condition. Maintenance shall include, but not be limited to, painting, structural repairs, and integrity of security measures. Site access shall be maintained to a level acceptable to the Shutesbury Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director. The owner or operator shall be responsible for the cost of maintaining the Solar Electric Installation and any access driveways.

B. Annual Reporting

The owner or operator of a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall submit an annual report demonstrating and certifying compliance with the Operation and Maintenance Plan, the requirements of this Section 8.9 and the approved special permit, including but not limited to continued management and maintenance of vegetation, compliance with the approved plans and any special permit conditions, continuation of liability insurance, and adequacy of road access. The annual report shall also provide information on the maintenance completed during the course of the year and the amount of electricity generated by the facility. The report shall be submitted to the Select Board, Planning Board, Fire Chief, Emergency Management Director, Building Commissioner, Board of Health and Conservation Commission (if a wetlands permit was issued) no later than 45 days after the end of the calendar year.

8.9-9 Abandonment or Decommissioning.

A. Removal Requirements.

Any Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation which has reached the end of its useful life or has been abandoned shall be removed. The owner or operator shall physically remove the

installation no later than 150 days after the date of discontinued operations. The owner or operator shall notify the Special Permit Granting Authority by certified mail, of the proposed date of discontinued operations and plans for removal.

Decommissioning shall consist of:

- 1. Physical removal of all components of the Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation, including but not limited to structures, foundations, equipment, security barriers, and on-site above-ground transmission lines. Associated off-site utility interconnections shall also be removed if no longer needed.
- 2. Disposal of all solid and hazardous waste in accordance with local, state, and federal waste disposal regulations.
- 3. Restoration of the site to its natural preexisting condition, including stabilization or revegetation of the site as necessary to minimize erosion. The Special Permit Granting Authority may allow the owner or operator to leave landscaping or designated belowgrade foundations and electric lines in order to minimize erosion and disruption to vegetation.

B. Decommissioning by the Town

If the owner or operator of a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation fails to remove such installation in accordance with the requirements of this Section 8.9 within 150 days of discontinued operations or abandonment, the Town may enter the property and physically remove the installation at the owner's expense, drawing from the escrow account or upon the bond or other financial surety provided by the applicant.

8.9-10 Lapse of Approval

Any special permit shall automatically lapse if the Large-or Small-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation is not installed and functioning within two (2) years of the grant of the special permit or if the installation shall be considered abandoned.

ADD THE FOLLOWING TO ARTICLE XIII, Section 13.2 – DEFINITIONS:

Solar Energy shall mean radiant energy received from the sun that can be collected in the form of heat or light by a solar collector.

Solar Photovoltaic Array shall mean an active Solar Energy collection device that converts solar energy directly into electricity whose primary purpose is to harvest energy by transforming solar energy into another form of energy or transferring heat from a collector to another medium using mechanical, electrical, or chemical means.

Solar Electric System shall mean a group of Solar Photovoltaic Arrays for the generation of electricity.

Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall mean a Solar Electric System that is affixed to the ground (not roof-mounted) and all appurtenant fencing, access driveways, drainage infrastructure, electronics, and any surrounding shade management areas.

Small-Scale Ground Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall mean a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation which occupies one and one-half (1.5) acres or less of land.

Large-Scale Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation shall mean a Ground-Mounted Solar Electric Installation which occupies more than one and one-half (1.5) acre of land and no greater than fifteen (15) acres of land.

Annual Town Meeting Minutes May 7, 2016

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Shutesbury qualified to vote in elections and town affairs held in the Shutesbury Elementary School at 23 West Pelham Road on the seventh day of May 2016 in the presence of a quorum, the following business was conducted. Moderator Penelope Kim opened the meeting at 9:05 AM. She introduced the public officials, identified the emergency exits, read a Civic Invocation and identified Town Meeting Time as the procedural guide for the meeting.

Town Meeting Attendees were invited to enjoy food and drink for sale at the Friends of the Library Café. The moderator asked who was attending their first town meeting and these people were applauded.

Article 1. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to amend the number of members on the Shutesbury Council on Aging from five citizens to seven citizens. The Shutesbury Council on Aging was established by the Town October 30, 1973, under the provisions of the General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 8B.

Sally Fairfield spoke for the Council On Aging (COA) and explained that the newsletter initiative and interest in the Aging In Place Task Force have increased the activities of the COA. An increase to seven members will help address these interests.

Passed unanimously.

Article 2. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to accept and approve the following resolution regarding the critical need for immediate action on fiber optic broadband service, as written below,

Whereas broadband service to our rural towns is critical infrastructure for economic survival;

Whereas our students' education is compromised by their inability to perform an increasing number of required online assignments; and

Whereas our residents are unable to utilize digital internet health care; and

Whereas broadband assures the interconnectivity essential to life in the 21st century; and

Whereas The Massachusetts legislature passed and the governor signed Bill H4355, an Act financing information technology equipment and related projects, on June 6, 2014, which authorized \$50 Million to the Massachusetts Broadband Incentive Fund for the purpose of providing broadband internet service to the unserved towns of western Massachusetts; and

Whereas in February 2015 the new Baker-Polito Administration affirmed its support for the bond bill and said that: "Providing high-speed broadband access to all cities and towns is not only a

matter of basic fairness, but it is an essential part of building stronger communities and a stronger economy"; and

Whereas on May 2, 2015 Shutesbury Annual Town Meeting, by a vote of 417 to 12, appropriated and authorized borrowing for \$1,693,200 for two-thirds of the costs for construction of a fiber optic network; and

Whereas on June 10, 2015 the voters of Shutesbury by a 92% favorable vote authorized a debt exclusion override for the fiber optic network; and

Whereas by August 1, 2015 over 52% of all the households in the Town of Shutesbury had signed up for service from WiredWest and made a \$49 deposit;

Whereas on August 4, 2015 the then Director of the Massachusetts Broadband Institute informed the Town of Shutesbury Selectboard that we had taken the necessary steps to begin construction of the fiber optic network; that the pole survey and design and engineering would begin in the next eight to nine weeks; that make ready work would begin in spring of 2016; and that construction would begin in the fall of 2016; and

Whereas little or no progress has been made on any of the steps needed to build the network;

THEREFORE be it resolved that we, the Citizens of the Town of Shutesbury in Town Meeting Assembled call upon the Baker/Polito Administration to commit all necessary resources to ensure the provision of fiber optic broadband service to all residents of Shutesbury; and

Expeditiously provide resolution to this most challenging situation by allocating the funds necessary to bring this project to conclusion; and

Instruct the Massachusetts Broadband Institute to work cooperatively with the towns and their agencies, including WiredWest, and to accept input and policy direction from the towns to jointly produce an immediate actionable plan that is acceptable to our town by June 30th, 2016.

Be it further resolved that the Town Clerk be directed to send copies of this resolution to Governor Charlie Baker, Lt. Governor Karyn Polito, State Representative Steve Kulik, State Senator Stan Rosenberg and Secretary Jay Ash.

A Power Point presentation was given by Gayle Huntress co-chair of the Broadband Committee. She covered a short history and the current status of Shutesbury's multi-year efforts to bring fiber optic access to all the citizens of Shutesbury. There was a little discussion and a few questions from the meeting members.

Passed in the majority with two abstentions.

Article 3. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to adopt a new section and thereby amend the Shutesbury Zoning ByLaw by adding a section entitled "Ground-Mounted Solar Electrical Installations."

Jeff Lacy from the Planning Board began his remarks with an apology for his harsh and abrupt behavior at the most recent Planning Board meeting. His apology was accepted.

He gave a history and review of the proposed bylaw additions. The Planning Board utilized citizen input and ideas drawn from other municipal bylaws. The bylaw proposal includes an exemption for a project that is currently in the special permitting process with the Planning Board. This project includes adjustments made over the course of the year long discussion of bylaw regulations. Although passage of the proposed bylaw will not be retroactive to include the Wheelock project, there will be conditions in the Special Permit meant to safeguard the town.

Citizens expressed appreciation at the overall receptiveness and concern the Planning Board exhibited in developing the bylaw. Concerns about how to assess possible Native American archeological presence, measuring net carbon effect, trail protection and environmental impacts were voiced by the audience. By paper ballot, the vote passed the required 2/3: 105 yes, 8 no, and 1 abstention.

Article 4 was withdrawn by Miriam Defant, one of the Citizen Petitioners. **Withdrawal unanimously accepted.**

Article 5 was withdrawn by Miriam Defant, one of the Citizen Petitioners. **Withdrawal unanimously accepted.**

Article 6. A motion was made and seconded that the town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate an agreement for the payments-in-lieu-of-taxes pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 59, Section 38H(b), and Chapter 164, Section 1, or any other enabling authority for personal property attributable to a solar photovoltaic facility to be located on privately owned land off Pratt Corner Road, Shutesbury, shown as Franklin County Registry of Deeds' Book 1032 Page 390 — Assessor's Lot ZG2, for a term of 25 years, and on such other terms and conditions and for such consideration as the Board of Selectmen deems appropriate. Passed unanimously.

Article 7. A motion was made and seconded for the Town to hear, and receive reports of town officers, committees, and boards.

Mike Vinskey praised retiring Select Board member, April Stein, for her many years of service to multiple town committees. Her insight, respect for other opinions, and perseverance made immeasurable contributions to Shutesbury. April thanked the community and reflected on how much she received back from the experience of participating in town government.

Susie Mosher thanked the multitude of volunteers that make the Town of Shutesbury work in a large art display entitled "Meeting Houses" that used less than 1/3 of all the meeting agendas for the year. Our government is truly of the people, by the people and for the people.

George Arvanitis spoke for the Personnel Board. The committee is redesigning the performance review process. They recommended 3% increase for town workers other than school personnel. The contract for

the police patrol staff will be negotiated in the coming year. He mentioned there are two openings on the board and encouraged citizens to volunteer.

Al Werner from the Water Resources Committee gave a Power Point presentation that explained some of the data captured so far. He noted the quality of the water and its quick recovery time following dry periods. The committee will research what conditions make the water quality good.

The Union 28 Superintendent, **Jen Haggerty**, gave accolades to the Shutesbury Elementary School program and community. She introduced Aaron Osborne, the Director of Operations and Finance.

Maria Geryk, Superintendent of the Amherst Regional Schools described the goals and opportunities of our middle and high school programs. She described a continuing decline in enrollment and some of the ideas being considered to increase enrollment and decrease fixed costs.

The Finance Committee Co-Chair, **George Arvanitis**, reviewed the Finance Committee 2017 Budget Report. The town's finances are commendable and stable. The Capital Stabilization fund is ready to handle costs associated to maintaining aging buildings and air quality problems. The future issues are Broadband costs, continued review of Regional assessment formula, decreasing enrollment in the schools, and free cash reserves invested in operating cost reductions.

Article 8. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to amend the Amherst Pelham Regional School District Agreement such that, notwithstanding Section VI, for Fiscal Year 2017 only, 10% of the operating budget assessment shall be allocated to each town based on proportionate shares of taxable property values and the other 90% will be allocated to the member towns in accordance with the per-pupil method found in the Amherst Pelham Regional School District Agreement.

"The School Committee has voted to use an alternative income method voted by the Amherst Pelham Regional School District School Committee to determine the apportionment of the FY17 budget to each member town. Approval to use this apportionment method must be granted each year."

George Arvanitis spoke about the proposed assessment changes that are favorable to Shutesbury. The proposal represents a \$27,000 decreased assessment over the current alternative method. The four towns in the Regional School District are expected to convene in May 2016 for further work on the assessment method. Sean Mangano, from the Regional School business office reiterated that the State statutory method that Shutesbury is modifying, is based on the state's assessment of the relative wealth of towns. In the past that formula has been unpredictable.

Passed unanimously.

Article 9. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to set the salary compensation for all elected officials of the town (Select Board, Town Clerk, Moderator and Constable) as provided by MGL Chapter 41, Section 108, to be made effective from July 1, 2016, as contained in the budget. Passed unanimously.

Article 10. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to meet town expenses including operations, capital, salaries and school expenses of \$6,155,690.00 by raising the sum of \$6,135,255.00 and transferring \$20,435.00 from the Septic Betterment Fund, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016.

The FY2017 Budget was reviewed by sections. There was a little discussion about the process for salary recommendations by the personnel board. Otherwise no amendments to the budget were made. **Passed unanimously.**

Article 11. A motion was made and seconded that Town vote to transfer \$100,000 from Free Cash to the Capital Stabilization Fund.

Passed unanimously.

Article 12. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to borrow \$100,000 and transfer from free cash \$92,000, of the sum of \$192,000 to fund a dump truck for the highway department.

Tim Hunting, the Highway Department Superintendent discussed the needs of the Town concerning sanding and plowing. He gave a history of the current truck, repair costs, drivers, and the costs, concerns and modifications needed for using a military surplus vehicle. Citizens had their questions answered and some expressed their appreciation for the good care the highway department provides year round.

By a show of hands, the vote passed by the required 2/3 majority: 51 yes, 11 no, and 1 abstention.

Article 13. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to accept and expend funds available from the State for Highway reimbursement programs, such as the Chapter 90 program, without further appropriation.

Passed unanimously.

Article 14. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Select Board, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenues for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016 in accordance with the MGL Chapter 44, Section 4 and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with the provisions of the MGL Chapter 44, Section 17.

Passed unanimously.

Article 15. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to allow the Select Board to apply for, accept and expend state, federal and other grants, which do not require a town appropriation. **Passed unanimously.**

Article 16. A motion was made and seconded that the Town approve the appointment pursuant to MGL Chapter 268A, Section 21A of Catherine Hilton as a Board of Health Administrative Consultant while also serving as an elected official on the Board of Health, or take any other action relative thereto. **Passed unanimously.**

Article 17. A motion was made and seconded that the Town of Shutesbury vote to act on the recommendation of the Community Preservation Committee on the fiscal year 2017 budget to transfer the following sums of money from the Community Preservation Fund estimated annual revenues: \$5,300 to Open Space; \$5,300 to Historic Resources; \$5,300 to Community Housing; and \$29,500 to the FY17 Community Preservation Fund budgeted reserve.

Donald Fletcher, Chair of the Community Preservation committee gave some background on the Community Preservation funds and the process of receiving and considering project proposals. **Passed unanimously.**

Article 18. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to appropriate \$ 2,400 from fiscal year 2017 Community Preservation Fund estimated annual revenues for necessary and proper administrative and operation expenses of the Shutesbury Community Preservation Committee, **Passed unanimously.**

Article 19. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$29,000 from the Community Preservation Fund; and to meet this appropriation, transfer \$29,000 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance, to rehabilitate a playground and replace a play structure, as detailed in the Shutesbury Elementary School project proposal, said funds to be expended under the direction of the Shutesbury Elementary School, or to take any action thereto.

Donald Fletcher praised the project sponsors whose efforts went into raising other funds, utilizing volunteers and filling out the application.

Passed unanimously.

Article 20. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000 from the Community Preservation Fund; and to meet this appropriation, transfer the sum of \$5,000 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance, to construct a track in the upper field, as detailed in the Shutesbury Elementary School project proposal, said funds to be expended under the direction of the Shutesbury Elementary School.

Passed unanimously.

Article 21. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to transfer from free cash a sum not to exceed \$10,000 to the fire department special equipment account said sum to be set as the proceeds from the sale of the police and fire rescue boat.

Passed unanimously.

Article 22. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to transfer from free cash, the sum of \$1,467.42 for the purpose of clearing a balance prior to FY06 for the Chapter 90 Highway.

Passed unanimously.

Article 23. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from free cash, the sum \$1,982.50 for the purpose of clearing a balance prior to FY06 for Public Safety Highway Grant. **Passed unanimously.**

Article 24. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or otherwise provide the sum of \$1,314.08 invoice #0384432 to Dennis K Burke for the payment of a fuel bill from prior years, and \$207.76, for Gazette invoice for legal notice paid with chk#47744, refunded to the town by Gazette in error.

Passed unanimously.

Article 25. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to authorize the following revolving funds for certain town departments under MGL Chapter 44, Section 53 E1/2 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, and to further authorize that any surplus in said accounts exceeding the amounts reflected below in the surplus column will be directed to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year, or take any other action relative thereto.

Passed unanimously.

A motion was made, seconded and unanimously voted to dissolve the meeting at 1:45 pm.

Shutesbury Select Board FY16 Annual Report

The composition of the Select Board has again changed with the election of Michael DeChiara to the Board. As new members come on board, new ideas, concepts, and suggestions are explored in an effort to improve and enhance the quality of life for Shutesbury residents.

This year the Select Board focused on four areas to assist with improving our town government and keeping residents informed about issues: Communications, Accessibility, and Transparency; Accountability and Operational Oversight; Community Engagement; and Select Board Operations.

Communications, Accessibility, and Transparency

In an effort to improve the flow of communication between the Select Board, residents, and other committees we began a review of the town website, emphasized the need to post meeting minutes and agendas, looked at ways to determine what materials and documents were of interest to residents, and explored ways we could get feedback from residents. We also were interested in finding ways to improve the sharing of information between committees as well as how we could get updates on activities, issues, and projects from our department heads.

We weren't able to accomplish everything on this list. In regards to getting feedback from residents we adapted our agendas to include a block of time for "Open Public Comment." Additionally, we grouped items of public interest together and addressed them in order on the agenda so residents that wanted to attend a Select Board meeting to hear about a particular issue would know approximately what time to arrive.

A majority of Select Board members felt it important to be advised of activities, issues, and projects from our department heads. While we haven't yet determined the best and most efficient method to accomplish this, we have received written updates on a semi-regular basis from the police department which has aided in our understanding of the department's problems with staffing, limited resources, and support.

A situation where emails to committees were going unacknowledged was brought to our attention. Upon research we found that many email accounts for various boards and committees were not being checked on a regular basis. We made this a topic for discussion at our annual All Boards meeting. Our goal is that one person from each committee (preferably the Chair) is tasked with the responsibility to acknowledge all emails to that committee in a timely manner. It's important to note that because of Open Meeting Law restrictions regarding deliberation an acknowledgement will necessarily be generic and noncommittal until the issue can be brought before the entire committee.

Accountability and Operational Oversight

In an effort to better understand the supervisory role of the Select Board; the current organizational structure of departments, boards, and committees was reviewed. During this process it became obvious that the Select Board is responsible for the performance, production, and professional development of boards and committees, but is especially responsible for department heads.

Along with this realization was the fact that no employee performance reviews had been conducted with department heads for several years. Current thinking in many human resources circles as well as Shutesbury's Personnel Board is that performance reviews are outdated and ineffective. Town Counsel also recommended against instituting a formal performance review process. Still, most of the Select Board felt there needed to be a process to inform the Select Board of "how it's going" and to establish some degree of accountability with each department head. We decided to institute a modified review session which would allow us an opportunity to express our expectations of department heads as well as allow department heads a chance to let us know what they expect from us. The first of these department head reviews began with the Town Administrator in May 2016.

The Select Board is responsible for other boards and committees, however the large number of these groups make it impossible to have a one-on-one review on a regular basis. We therefore rely on committee meeting minutes and agendas to allow us the insight necessary to stay up to date on their issues, projects, and performance.

Shutesbury relies on close to 200 volunteers to help keep things running. Linda Avis Scott (Administrative Secretary) and Susie Mosher (Town Clerk) teamed up and created a new member handout that brings a "one stop shopping" experience to new volunteers who need to be sworn in and receive mandatory ethics, sexual harassment, and open meeting law training. It's important to acknowledge the service individuals have given when their terms expire or they need to resign from their position. Linda prepares a thank you letter for each of these volunteers that is signed by the Select Board. Susie continued to create the "hands" display of volunteer names that decorate the school gym during annual Town Meeting. And this year we had the first annual volunteer appreciation picnic proposed and organized by Becky Torres (Town Administrator) to say thanks to all committee and board members and town employees. It's small compensation for those who volunteer, but it goes without saying that we couldn't do what we do without their support. Thank you.

Community Engagement

It's important for the Select Board to know what issues and expectations are important to residents. We wanted to formally address this need by developing a survey to be completed by residents. However, the Master Plan Working Group (a working group created by the Planning Board tasked to create a visioning statement in preparation for updating the Master Plan) will be conducting meetings with residents to determine what residents want Shutesbury to look like during the next ten years. In order to avoid duplicating efforts, the Select Board decided to hold off on preparing any surveys until after the working group has completed their tasks.

In the meantime the Select Board attempted to make themselves available to the public as much as possible. We manned pumpkin painting, donut eating and ball toss booths at Celebrate Shutesbury. We held a Soup, Salad, and Bread dinner at the Shutesbury Athletic Club. We attended Shutesbury Elementary School performances as well as the spaghetti dinner. We used these opportunities to connect directly with residents to better understand the needs and concerns of people in town.

Select board Operations

With the trend toward an annual turnover of members on the Select Board, we found that recurrent and routine processes were not standardized. Each time a routine issue came up we spent too much time discussing and establishing how we would handle the issue. To eliminate this, we decided to codify board operations and policies/procedures by developing a Select Board Policy Manual. We scheduled several "working" meetings devoted only to reviewing, discussing, and drafting this manual. At the close of FY16 we were about half way finished with the document. We hope to have it completed by mid term of FY17.

We are devoting a large amount of time and effort to accomplish these goals because we feel it is important to keep residents updated, informed and involved. We want you to know what is going on at Town Hall. We want you to have access to the information and data you need to make informed decisions. We want you to know there is always someone willing to listen to you. We also want you to know that the people who work for you are doing what you expect and doing it efficiently. Only with town government working for you will we be able to continue to prosper and thrive.

Board of Assessors Annual Report, FY 2016

The board continued doing property inspections throughout the year as part of its cyclical re-inspection program. New construction and Proposition 2 ½ increased the maximum levy limit by \$141,214 for FY16.

The FY 2016 tax rate of \$22.08 per \$1,000 of valuation was calculated by dividing the total amount of money the town needs to collect in taxes, (\$4,686,775), the levy, by the total assessed value of all real and personal property (\$212,263,400) and multiplying the result by 1000. Every additional \$212,000 spent by the town will add \$1.00 to the tax rate. Below is the FY 2016 levy breakdown by property class:

Over the fiscal year the board approved a total of \$18,646.85 in motor vehicle abatements, \$9,220.05 in 22 real estate abatements, \$11,734.67 in statutory exemptions, and \$596.57 in CPA exemptions and abatements.

Amanda Alix retired from the Board at the end of June 2015 after serving for nearly 20 years. Diane Jacoby joined the board in January 2016. Lynda Grybko retired from the Assessors Clerks position at the end of June, 2015 after working in the office for about 15 years. Leslie Bracebridge, former Town Clerk, became the Assessors Clerk in June 2015.

The office is open Monday and Tuesday, 10-3, Wednesday from 1 - 3, and Thursday from 12-4. The Board currently meets every first and third Tuesday at 5:45 PM in the Town Hall.

The annual flu clinic was held in October as usual. However, because of ever-increasing difficulties and requirements, the board made the decision to give up vaccine provider status, with the intention of continuing to hold a flu clinic/EDS exercise using some other provider yet to be identified, possibly a commercial pharmacy.

Through the Department of Public Health's Local Health Internship Program, we were assigned a student from the University of Massachusetts for the summer to work on neighborhood organization.

Community Preservation Committee Fiscal Year 2016 Report

Shutesbury's Community Preservation by-law created a Community Preservation Committee comprised of up to nine representatives of town boards, commissions and committees with functions that are related to community preservation. The members of Shutesbury Community Preservation Committee during Fiscal Year 2016 were Leslie Bracebridge, Historical Commission; Linda Avis Scott, Conservation Commission; Sue Essig, Open Space Committee, Rita Farrell, community housing; Jim Aaron, Planning Board; Allen Hanson, Finance Committee; Michael Vinskey, Select Board; and Donald Fletcher, the "at-large" member and its chairperson.

The Community Preservation Committee (CPC) began Fiscal Year 2016 with its annual review of what it learned during the prior fiscal year. As a result, the Committee revised its process for reviewing proposed projects. The CPC decided that, prior to determining eligibility, it needed to gather more specific information related to whether proposed projects meet the minimum eligibility criteria for the use of CPA funds. The CPC also it decided that, after it determines that proposed projects are eligible, applicants need more time to prepare final applications. As a result of these decisions, the CPC added a question to the Determination of Eligibility Preliminary Application form, adopted "Due Diligence Guidelines" to ensure a thorough review of the preliminary applications, and added two weeks to the time available for applicants to complete and submit final project proposals.

During the first phase of the application process in Fiscal Year 2016, two applicants submitted a total of three Determination of Eligibility applications. Applicants attended the CPC meeting when the eligibility of each project was discussed. During that meeting the CPC members informed the applicants of the steps in the annual review process and the additional information needed in the full application, which is the second phase of the application process. The CPC also described the three open CPC meetings that applicants are expected to attend during the Committee's review process. The CPC members also discussed the criteria that the committee had developed and would use when deciding whether to recommend that Town Meeting approve the community preservation funds requested for the proposed projects.

During Fiscal Year 2016 two applicants, the Shutesbury Community Church and the Shutesbury Elementary School, submitted initial Determination of Eligibility applications for three projects. The CPC determined that all three proposed projects were eligible to receive CPA funds. The Shutesbury Community Church chose not to submit a full application for its proposal to make its first floor accessible. The Shutesbury Elementary School submitted two full applications and completed the review process. These projects involve the restoration of the young children's playground and the construction of a multi-use track on the school's upper field. After its review process the CPC recommended that Town Meeting approve funding for the two recreation projects proposed by the Shutesbury Elementary School.

After completing its review and evaluation, the CPC members voted unanimously on March 17, 2016, to recommend funding the projects. When the CPC compared the proposed projects to our selection criteria we were impressed. We determined that <u>each</u> project:

- is financially and administratively feasible,
- has other sources of funding,
- includes significant in-kind volunteer contributions,
- has support from town residents, town boards or committees,
- will provide a positive impact on the community, and
- is a step toward achieving long standing, but unfunded, priority goals for Shutesbury.

The total cost of the two projects being recommended by the CPC this year is \$34,000, which is \$13,700 less than the estimated Community Preservation Fund revenue for Fiscal Year 2017.

The Shutesbury Elementary School requested \$29,000 to rehabilitate the young children's playground and to replace its major play structure. The restoration of the existing playground will create an easily accessible playground space for small children, which includes children with disabilities. There are three parts to this project:

- the purchase of an ADA accessible playground structure
- the certified installation of that structure, and
- the resurfacing the playground with a code compliant surface.

The existing wooden playground structure had become an increasing hazard for children. The number of splinters has increased significantly. Children have also been injured falling onto the existing pea-stones surface on the playground. The existing pea stone surface does not comply with existing safety codes.

The rehabilitated play ground and new play structure will benefit Shutesbury's young children who attend the Elementary School; and it will be a resource for families with young children after school hours, on the weekends and during vacations. Off street parking is already available nearby with a paved walk leading to the playground. Completion of this project will help accomplish long-standing goals in Shutesbury to enhance the existing recreational infrastructure.

Letters of support for this project were submitted by the:

- Shutesbury's Parent Teacher Organization
- Community Network for Children Program
- Shutesbury Elementary School Nurse
- Girls and Boys on the Student Council

The PTO and the Shutesbury Athletic Club have committed to donate funds to support the playground restoration. The volunteers (parents, teachers and support staff at the school) organized this project on their own time.

The Shutesbury Elementary School's second proposed recreation project requested \$5,000 to construct a multi-use track that circles the outer edge of the upper field behind the school. It will be

usable and safe for many different populations. The construction would involve digging out the top 6" of soil for a 6' wide 1/8th mile long track – 660 feet. The bottom of the trench will be leveled and then filled with packed gravel. A layer of small hard packed trap rock will be on top and will be level with the surrounding ground.

A 100-mile running/walking club will be promoted at the elementary school to excite children about exercising and outdoor fun. The track will enhance and increase the use of an existing community field and restore interest in this town-owned recreation space. Because the school maintenance staff will be able to plow the track's surface, the construction of the track will allow the upper field to be used through the winter months. The Shutesbury Council on Aging supports the multi-use track for older residents who need a flat, level surface for walking or to monitor their walking distance. The track will also be a benefit for the MN Spear Library story walk program that has operated in the upper field.

The Swift River School in New Salem constructed a similar track, which has been very successful. Students at the Shutesbury Elementary School have written heart-warming letters of support. The teachers and especially the physical education teacher are exited about creating an opportunity for organized and structured physical activities.

As the CPC discussed ideas for worthwhile community preservation projects, it recognized that each successful project depends on a group of committed volunteers to organize the project, to complete a thorough application and se through the review process, and to oversee implementation through project completion. In the CPC's annual presentation to Town Meeting, those attending were reminded of the range of worthwhile community preservation projects and that worthwhile projects will require volunteers to come together to develop projects that will meet town goals. During FY 2016, a group of volunteers devoted their energies and creativity to organize and propose two projects that were endorsed at the Annual Town Meeting.

The Community Preservation Committee thanks the citizens of Shutesbury for its continuing interest, contributions, and support for our community's preservation projects.

Shutesbury Conservation Commission Annual Report

July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016

The Shutesbury Conservation Commission (SCC) is responsible for protecting the town's natural resources. Much of our time is spent administering the Massachusetts Wetland Protection Act (G.L. Ch. 131 § 40) and the Town's Wetlands Bylaw. As part of these responsibilities, the Commission carried out the following activities:

Requests for Determination of Applicability	9	Enforcement Order	0

Site visits, conducted by two or more commissioners, are past of most activities. The 44 site visits were associated with 41 projects/sites of which 6 were town-affiliated and 15 were on or near Lake Wyola. Of the 13 building permits signed by SCC, we note that 5 were for ground mounted solar arrays.

Wheelock Solar Farm Project Notice of Intent hearing for 30-acre solar farm proposed by Lake Street Development Partners (located on Cowls property off Pratt Corner Road) opened in July 2015. The commission voted to hire a 3rd party consultant (under G.L. Ch.44 § 53G) for wetland/stormwater review of this complex project. Emily Stockman of Stockman Associates was selected to conduct the review and she presented her preliminary report in September 2015. In December and prior to Stockman's final report, the project applicant delivered a revised site plan that moved the project outside the 100' buffer zone and thus outside the commission's jurisdiction. SCC members attended Planning Board meetings to follow the project through their permitting process.

Management of Conservation Restrictions and Conservation Areas

Baker Fields Conservation Restriction In 2015, fencing was installed as specified in SCC's Enforcement Order (8.19.14) to halt degradation of the wetland traversing the field that fronts Pelham Hill Road. Following this, Kestrel Land Trust (KLT) prepared a revised baseline documentation report. In spring 2016, discussion with KLT began on a Memorandum of Understanding which would designate KLT as the primary contact for Baker Fields CR. The property is sold in spring 2016 resulting in an initial site visit and meeting with the new property owners to learn about proposed new projects. The need for management plans that honor the attributes of the CR and include wetlands protection was emphasized. KLT requested that they be part of future discussions.

Old Peach Orchard Conservation Restriction No action

Sumner Mountain Conservation Restriction In February 2016, the commission agreed to accept the Sumner Mountain CR and it became the first CR created through the Open Space Design Bylaw's site plan review process. The final plan was presented in April 2016 and is now under review by the MA EOEEA. During this multi-year process the commission held several discussions on the complexity and time investment required to hold CRs. As part of discussion of the Sumner Mountain CR, the commission voted to require for this CR, and any CRs that it takes on in the future, that the CR holder will pay for the initial baseline survey and also deposit funds into a CR stewardship account to defray the cost of annual monitoring visits and preparation of monitoring reports.

Rostas and Gang Conservation Area The commission will work with the Town of Amherst to find a new mower for the Rostas and Gang field which abuts Amherst's Haskins Meadow CA. Field continues as liaison with Amherst for this property.

South Brook Conservation Area UMASS student Olivia Dolan presented the SCC with her report "Town of Shutesbury Conservation Areas Management Plan Recommendations and Trail Mapping" which covers the South Brook Conservation Area. Her work will assist in developing usage guidelines for the property.

Budget

The May 2015 Town Meeting approved an expense line of \$1,164 and continued the Clerk's salary at \$5,006 (27 hrs/mo Mar-Oct and 22 hrs/mo Nov-Feb). SCC collected fees totaling \$135 for WPA filing fees and \$200 in Town Bylaw fees.

Other Activities

Scott continues to serve as SCC liaison on the Community preservation Committee Jaques and Fleischaker followed the Planning Board's permitting process for the Wheelock Solar Farm project.

Commission Membership We continue to operate with four members (Barry Field, Gail Fleischaker, Penny Jaques and Darci Maresca) and have one open seat. The Commission's work is greatly supported by the expert assistance of Conservation Clerk, Linda Avis Scott.

Council on Aging (COA) Annual Report for July 1, 2015- June 30, 2016

The COA provided a wide range of activities this year. We wish to thank all of the volunteers who helped make Shutesbury welcoming to our elders. Please let us know if there are new programs and activities we can provide. Sally Fairfield has stepped up to become our quarterly newsletter editor. The Med-Ride program is a volunteer program that transports Shutesbury residents over 55 who need rides to medical/dental appointments in Hampshire, Hampden, and Franklin Counties. Six regular volunteer drivers provided 102 rides during this period. Also new, is a monthly foot care clinic run by "Footcare by Nurses". Fifty-two people had their feet cared for. Also, a new task force called "Aging in Place" was formed to find ways seniors can stay in their homes as long as possible. David Wheeler became our web page master and keeps the COA page updated with information and current activities.

Other regular programs included monthly Pot Luck luncheons on the first Tuesday of each month, Tai Chi Wednesday evenings, Yoga classes, and Monday morning coffee drop-ins. The COA held fall and spring open houses and sponsored a special program called "Staying True to Ourselves".

COA funding includes an annual state grant of \$4000 and a \$200 town appropriation. We spend the funds on program activities, newsletters, med-ride travel reimbursements, and general administration and office supplies.

Current COA members are Marilyn Tibbetts/Chair, David Wheeler, Jean Footit, David Dann/Secretary, Melissa Makepeace-O'Neil, and Linda Avis Scott.

Shutesbury Finance Committee Fiscal Year 2016 Budget Report

The Finance Committee met 25 times this year, had liaison meetings with other town committees and attended various local, regional and state meetings and conferences. FY14 spending came out as predicted and FY15 spending is in line with the budget. There were no unanticipated large costs and there were a few windfalls.

We have prepared a balanced budget for FY16.

1. Some of the larger operating increases compared to the FY15 budget:

- * Regional School: \$86k
- * Local school: \$40k (adjusted to reflect \$100k FY15 cash reserve funding for a one time expenditure)
- * Non-school Employees Salary \$15k (approx. 2%)
- * OPEB (Other Post Employment Benefits): \$10k
- * Veterans benefits: \$8k
- * Total actual increase \$172k

2. Some of the Projected Revenue Increases:

- * 2.5% levy increment: \$114k
- * New growth: \$39k (\$19k added in FY15 Recap & \$20k projected in FY16)
- * \$17k local sources added in FY15 Recap
- * State aid \$3k
- * Total increase \$172k

3. Cash Reserves Summary

* Free Cash \$1.3M

Used for non-operating expenses - requires simple majority vote by town voters

* Capital Stabilization: \$332k

Used for anticipated re-occurring capital expense ie. boiler, roofs, machinery, etc. Requires 2/3 majority vote

* Stabilization: \$251k

Our town's savings account, requires 2/3 majority vote.

4. Finance Committee FY16 warrant article capital expenses recommended:

- * Broadband network \$1.7M, proposed debt exclusion override (2/3 vote needed)



The Franklin Regional Council of Governments provides a variety of services and programming to the municipalities of Franklin County and to the greater Franklin County region. The FRCOG's 2016 Annual Report, which will be available in April of 2017 and on www.frcog.org shortly thereafter, will highlight our work over the past year. Specific services to the Town of Shutesbury in 2016 included:

Collective Bidding & Purchasing Program

- Shutesbury contracted with the FRCOG to receive cooperative bid pricing for up to 24 different Highway Products and Services. Total estimated highway needs for FY17 is \$311,820.
- Shutesbury participated in the Gasoline, and Diesel Fuel bids.

Franklin County Cooperative Inspection Program

• Staff issued 103 building permits for Shutesbury in 2016. Eight Certificates of Inspection issued.

Planning and Development Department

- Staff explored the feasibility of fixed route transit service for the towns of Leverett, New Salem, Shutesbury, and Wendell.
- Staff assisted the Town in updating their Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan, which was approved by FEMA on January 8, 2016.

Regional Preparedness Program

- Staff conducted quarterly contact drills and a site notification drill to test the *Shutesbury Emergency Dispensing Site Plan*.
- Staff met with the Shutesbury Emergency Management Team to assist with the Neighborhood Safety Net project.
- Shutesbury entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the FRCOG to recognize the Multi-Agency Coordination Center as the official organization to assist them with emergency management needs.

Annual Report for the Calendar Year Ending December 31, 2015

To the reader:

The Franklin Regional Retirement System is a government agency that serves the 503 retirees, 51 beneficiaries, 951 active employees, and 557 inactive members of the towns and agencies in Franklin County. We are organized under Chapter 34b, and subject to the provisions of Chapter 32 of the Massachusetts General Laws. We receive oversight on the state level from the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission (PERAC), which audits our operations and financial records every three years. We are also audited by independent auditors in the two intervening years, as well as a complete actuarial valuation every two years.

The retirement benefit we provide replaces participation in the Social Security system and is described as a "defined benefit", which means that we pay monthly retirement benefits based on the age, salary, and number of years worked at the time a member of our system retires. To be a member, an employee in one of our government units must be working in a permanent position scheduled at 20 hours or more per week and earning \$5,000 or greater annually. Funding of these benefits begins with deductions from the member, and, combined with matching funds from the employing unit, are invested in a mix of stocks, bonds, and indexed funds. Investment earnings are a large part of the funding of retirement benefits, and the allocation of those funds are spread to a variety of sectors to take advantage of positive activity as it occurs in each sector. Please make note of our investment performance percentages in the chart on the next page.

Up until 1988, we were a "pay-as-you-go" system. In 1988 it was legislated that we begin saving to become "fully funded" over the ensuing 40 years. Fully funded means we have enough in reserves to pay for all the current and future potential benefits of our present membership. At the end of 2015, we are 78.2% funded at 27 years (67.5%) into the 40 year mandate.

Our fiscal year is the calendar year, therefore our annual report is not filed until May of the subsequent year, and as a consequence the information provided herein will be a year old by the time you read this. Current reports and information can be found on our website: www.FRRSMA.com.

Shutesbury Highway Department

FY 2016 Annual Report

The Highway Department continued the maintenance of all roads, trucks and equipment, and buildings as usual. The highway crew consists of a superintendent, two full time workers, and a part time snow plow operator.

Due to a relatively mild winter a good deal of tree work was done all around town in F/Y 2016. Our crew worked at removing dead, or problem trees and cutting brush throughout the winter. Local tree companies were hired in July, January, and June to remove problem trees.

The mild winter allowed us to organize our back area, behind the garage, where blocks, culverts, gravel and stone are stored. We built an enclosure over the residents sand bin, replaced lights and switches in the sand/salt barn, and renovated our bathroom.

Chapter 90 funds were used for the reclamation, grading, and paving of High Point Drive, crack filling on Leverett/Cooleyville/Prescott Rd. and Pelham Hill Rd., and blacktop shimming and chip seal on West Pelham Rd.

The town crew replaced two culverts with headwalls on Wendell Rd and replaced a culvert and headwalls on Leonard Rd.

In October we welcomed new employee, Doug Smith, to our crew.

On October 19 we started a project with W.W. Clark on Montague Rd. in the area of # 408, aka "Task Hill". This area of steep incline has been a problem for the motoring public and highway trucks, especially in the winter. About 3 feet of material was removed from the steepest area of the hill and regraded. The driveways were adjusted and graded as well as the side banks with loam added and seeded. Clarks crew trucked in large stones to retain the sandy east bank from washing out .

Mud season came early this year in February but wasn't severe thankfully.

In April all paved streets were swept, and in May catch basins were cleaned. Also in May at town meeting funding for a new highway dump truck was approved.

Lastly we have been using our new highway mower, purchased in August, all around town and are very pleased with its performance.

Shutesbury Historical Commission Fiscal Year 2016 Annual Report

Members of the Historical Commission thank the voters of Shutesbury and the Board of Selectmen for the honor and privilege of serving the town's historical and preservation needs in Fiscal Year 2016, and for the guidance and support offered by the Board of Selectmen and many others throughout the year. We look forward to continued service and collaboration in the coming year.

The Commission met regularly throughout the year and continued all established annual programs:

- 1. The 1829 Towne House/Old Town Hall open house during Celebrate Shutesbury,
- 2. The October West Schoolhouse Open House,
- 3. The 2 fall community hikes to the Felton mill site complex and the Atherton Brook sawmill site.
- 4. Representation throughout the year on the Community Preservation Committee,
- 5. Representation at the Select Board's All Boards meeting, and
- 6. Town flag representation in the Quabbin Park Memorial Day parade and remembrance services. The latter activity provided us with Schmidt family trust funds, which support local historical preservation projects.

Planned to become an annual Commission event, we participated in the May 2016 kick start *Uniquely Quabbin* weekend, which included the first issue of a new magazine to promote regional economic development. Historical commissions and societies from all towns surrounding Quabbin Reservoir were invited to produce programs with a focus on history, for this all-in-one weekend event. Since Shutesbury's 1735 legislative beginning as Roadtown, was in compensation for the cart road our founders built from Lancaster to Sunderland to promote economic development for our Massachusetts Bay Colony, it seemed fitting that our program would focus on our roads. Where was the original cart road? What impact did the 1920's to 1930's land takings of the Swift River Valley for today's Quabbin Reservoir have on Shutesbury's roads and our economy? Using photos, documents, and a hike down some of Shutesbury's discontinued roads, these and many other questions were answered, and little known facts were shared. Plans are already in the works for our Commission's participation in a similar program next year.

The Commission notes appreciation for the independent report of Town Buildings Committee member Robert Groves concerning the 1829 Town Hall, the October reports of the Town Clerk regarding inclusive planning with the Historical Commission on the need for expanded archival storage and the care and use of the 1829 old town hall, guidance received from the Select Board regarding proper use of municipal email and the town website, and our April 2016 collaborative meeting with Rolf Cachet-Schilling regarding some of Shutesbury's unexplained archaeological artifacts. We look forward to collaborating on these and new special initiatives in the coming year.

The Historical Commission coordinated efforts of our town's Veterans' Services Representative, Town Center Committee and our Commission to repair the Town Common flag pole. We began planning repairs to the Town Pound gateway, and will look into restoration of the vintage town line highway signs with input from the Highway Superintendent.

Many town history inquiries were managed throughout the year. We welcome such questions and we welcome new historical information provided by anyone at any time. Papers, reports, photos, artifacts, suggestions for oral interviews are all welcome. We will gladly photograph, copy or record, and will return all original information in the presence of the provider. We are very grateful to those who have given information, donated historical artifacts and joined in our many programs throughout the year. We look forward to continuing our efforts in the protection, preservation and presentation of more of Shutesbury's history in the coming year.

Old Town Beach Improvement Project Committee

Annual report

July 1 2015 – June 30 2016

This committee's project, to develop William G. Elliott Waterfront Park at the site of the former town beach on Lake Wyola, advanced minimally this year. Working with the Conservation Commission, the committee refined its plans and reconsidered the placement of park elements with respect to wetlands on the site. Three dead or diseased hemlock trees were removed by the Highway Department, with permission from the Consevation Commission.

MASTER PLAN WORKING GROUP

Funds were allotted at the 2015 Annual Town Meeting to hire a consulting firm to guide the visioning activities. The goal was to hire a firm experienced in visioning, planning, facilitation and outreach skills in order to engage a representative cross section of town residents that would help determine and articulate what we want for our town over the next 10-15 years.

Early in 2016, twelve town residents were appointed by the Planning and Select Boards to develop, orchestrate and complete a town Visioning process. They were sworn in as the Master Plan Working Group (MPWG). The MPWG members are: Mary Anne Antonellis, Michele Cunningham, Nancy Dill, Bob Groves, Al Hanson, Dale Houle, Dave Kittredge, Jeff Lacy, Meryl Mandell, Brad Spry, Mike Vinskey, Melissa Warwick. More recently, Jeanne Brown joined the Group.

Between March and May of 2016, the MPWG developed a set of desired outcomes for this process and created a Request for Proposal (RFP). The RFP was distributed and two consulting firms: The Cecil Group, and Beals + Thomas, responded. Both groups participated in an evening of lively interviews and a mock 15-minute facilitation session with the MPWG. The Cecil Group emerged as the MPWG's unanimous choice. Following a very positive reference check, the Board of Selectmen acted on the MPWG's recommendation and collectively voted to award the bid to the Cecil Group at their August 16 Select board meeting.

Plans for FY 17 include meetings between the MPWG and Cecil Group to prepare for and host two public Visioning workshops.

Recycling and Solid Waste Committee Fiscal Year 2016

FY 2016 has been good year for the RSWC and for recycling and composting in Shutesbury. We had some trouble with the June 2016 Bulky Waste Day when the roll-offs didn't arrive on time and the day had to be extended to 4:00 p.m. Many thanks to the volunteers who stayed on for the extra hours. Once again the Recycling and Solid Waste Committee couldn't do this work without the help of several volunteers, the Highway Department, the Police Department, Tom Clark, and our hauler, Republic Services. In June we made a different arrangement with Gold Circuit E-Cycling, the company that collects our electronics and Styrofoam. From now on, we will stow electronics and Styrofoam in the Highway Department salt-sand shed, and Gold Circuit will come pick these items up the following week.

Last year the Town of Shutesbury recycled 182.10 tons of paper and containers, which saved us \$11,290.20 in tipping fees to dispose of trash at the Covanta co-generation facility in Agawam. Our recycling was 35.44% of the total waste stream, a little off last year's figure of 37.77%. That's still pretty good, in comparison with other Massachusetts towns, but Shutesbury can do even better. The RSWC would love to get to 50% or more. Everyone can help reach that goal by reducing, reusing, and recycling.

In FY 2016, we again received a \$500 grant from the Department of Environmental Protection and a \$1200 grant through the DEP "Recycling Rewards" program. With these funds we purchased trash bags and will purchase more recycling bins that we sell to Shutesbury residents at a greatly reduced cost. We should be able to obtain these same grants in the coming year.

FY 16/17 Amherst Pelham Regional Schools

General Information

The Amherst-Pelham Regional School District serves the residents of Amherst, Leverett, Pelham and Shutesbury. The Amherst Regional Middle School serves grades seven and eight, the Amherst Regional High School serves grades nine through twelve, and South East Campus provides an alternative educational option for students in grades nine through twelve, with and without special education needs, who learn best in an alternative setting from the main campus. The regional district also accepts students through the state's school choice program at both the middle and high schools.

FY16 Budget Review

The recommended budget for fiscal year (FY) 2017 is \$30,804,122, an increase of \$781,282. This represents a 2.60% increase over the FY 2016 budget. Under this proposal, the total percentage increase to town assessments is 2.00% which is the lowest increase since FY 2010. Elected officials from the member towns did not unanimously support the existing regional agreement assessment method but also did not favor using the State's assessment method. As a result, the regional district developed a modified regional agreement assessment method to be used for one year while officials meet to identify a long term solution. The FY 2017 budget is based on a modified regional agreement assessment method which determines 10% of the assessment by wealth and the other 90% by a five year rolling average of student enrollment. This method allocates assessments as shown below:

Fiscal year 2017 is a year of great opportunity. A new partnership is being formed with Greenfield Community College and an existing partnership with LSSE is being strengthened. The new relationship with GCC will provide enhanced educational opportunities for students and allow them to earn college credit. LSSE, which operates afterschool and summer programs in many of our schools, is moving their headquarters from town center to the middle school. Lastly and perhaps most importantly, the District will begin incorporating 21st century learning practices into its curriculum which will make learning more rigorous and relevant.

Amherst-Pelham Regional School Committee

The Amherst-Pelham Regional School Committee is comprised of the five elected representatives to the Amherst School Committee, two of the elected members of the Pelham School Committee, and one member each from the elected representatives to the Leverett and Shutesbury School Committees. The School

Committees from Pelham, Leverett and Shutesbury each appoint their Regional representatives from among their membership. The Chair of the ARHS Student Advisory Committee also serves as an ex-officio, non-voting member of the Regional School Committee, as required by Massachusetts General Law Chapter 71.

School Committee Annual Report FY 2016 July 1 2015 - June 30, 2016

The Shutesbury School Committee currently consists of Kathryn Fiander, Dan Hayes, Fred Steinberg, Steve Sullivan, and Lauren Thomas-Paquin. Sean Woodard was a member and Chair until February 2016, when he moved out of town and resigned from the committee. Lauren Thomas-Paquin won election to a 3-year term in May, 2016.

Steinberg took over as Chair when Woodard resigned; Fiander as Secretary (Vice-Chair.) Fiander and Hayes served as Shutesbury representatives to the Union #28 Joint Supervisory Committee, which Hayes chaired. Hayes also chaired the Collaborative for Educational Services. Sullivan merits special recognition for continued diligent service as the committee's representative to the Amherst-Pelham region - this position required attending many meetings on a proposed K-12 Regionalization, modifications to the 4-town assessment method, and extended Executive Sessions re the Amherst District's Superintendent resignation/settlement agreement.

As of September, 2015 the elementary school enrollment is just over 100 K-6 students, and 20 pre-school students. The low enrollment level is a cause for concern, regarding the effect of very small class sizes on education, as well as the viability of keeping current staffing levels.

Major activities of the committee:

- Kathryn Fiander and Fred Steinberg won re-election to the committee at the May, 2015 Town Meeting. There were no other candidates for the two contested seats.
- approved a Fiscal Year 2017 budget for consideration by Town Meeting, in the amount of \$1,900,318; a 1.3% increase from the previous year. Town Meeting voted to approve the budget, May, 2016.
- participated in hiring of a new Superintendent for Union 28, Jennifer Haggerty; and a new Directory of Finance and Operations, Aaron Osborne
- approved the Principal's request for School Choice for the Elementary School for the 2016-2017 school year
- ongoing discussions of Standardized Testing its usefulness, and effects on students, teachers, and staff

One Hundred and Twenty-Ninth Annual Report Trustees of the M.N. Spear Memorial Library Fiscal Year 2016

Hours

During Fiscal Year 2016, the M.N. Spear Memorial Library was open 28 hours per week. Monday and Wednesday, 11 am -1 pm and 3- 6 pm Tuesday and Thursday, 3-7:30 pm Friday, 3- 6 pm Saturday, 10 am -1 pm, Sunday, 3- 6 pm

Staff

Mary Anne Antonellis, Director, 40 hours per week Cynthia Coffin, Library Assistant, 11-12 hours per week

Linda Avis Scott, Susan Millinger, Julie Stepanek and Joann Bernhard covered the two weekend shifts on a rotating basis and substituted occasionally for other shifts.

Volunteers

In Fiscal Year 2016, twelve volunteers contributed over 424 hours of service. In July, David Holmes, a Shutesbury carpenter, volunteered to handcraft a new sign to replace the old one which had deteriorated. In July and August, Jeannette Stockton, a summer resident from New York, volunteered to teach a weekly gentle yoga class.

The Collection

In Fiscal Year 2016 the total holdings were 12,111 items. The collection included 8,058 books, 778 audiobooks, 175 music CDs, 2,707 DVDs, and 33 magazine subscriptions. Shutesbury residents also had access to 186,380 e-books, 11,324 downloadable audiobooks, and 997 downloadable videos through the C/W MARS Overdrive Collection and the Commonwealth E-book Collection.

Circulation

1,191 registered patrons borrowed 33,474 items, a ten percent increase over Fiscal Year 15. Total circulation included 13,682 books, 957 magazines, 2,889 audio books, 13,216 videos, 2,420 digital items, and 310 miscellaneous items. These figures include 4,737 items received through Inter-Library Loan facilitated through our C/W MARS membership. 4,852 items were loaned to patrons at other libraries through Inter-Library Loan.

Programs

The Library offered 127 programs with more than 1,803 attendees. Programs included a very popular weekly gentle yoga class in July and August, held at Town Hall, taught by volunteer, Jeannette Stockton. The popularity of the class inspired Mary Anne to apply for grant funding to provide weekly yoga classes in March and April. The spring classes were met with even more enthusiasm, leading to collaboration with the Council on Aging, who offered to fund yoga for the month of June. The Friends of the Library sponsored two delicious chocolate programs, in July, DeDe Wilson offered a chocolate tasting program and in February, Leslie Cerier offered a chocolate cooking class. In October, the Marglin Family, Leonard Road, invited the Friends of the Library to host an apple picking fundraiser in their private orchard. It was a successful fundraiser and also a lovely community program. Also in October, the Friends of the Library sponsored a celebration of National Magic Month with a visit from *Ed the Wizard*. In the spring we participated in a regional community read of *Being Mortal* by Dr. Atul Gawande. The multi-town project was coordinated by the Forbes Library in Northampton and Cooley Dickinson Hospital. Fifty people borrowed the book and we offered a screening of a documentary about physician assisted suicide, "How to Die in Oregon" and a book discussion facilitated by a volunteer from the Palliative Care Department at the Hospital.

Survey

In the spring we conducted an online survey to gather community feedback about the library and its services. This survey will help inform our long range planning.

233 people completed the survey. 98% were Shutesbury Residents.

33% of respondents use the library weekly or more, 20 % monthly, and 37% reported using the library rarely or never. When asked why they use the library, respondents indicated a strong use of the collection: 73% use the library to borrow books, 55% to borrow DVDs, and 43% to pick-up holds. In the 2014 survey, 31% responded

that they use the library to pick up holds, so this is a notable increase. We also note an increase of awareness and use of our online catalog through C/W MARS with more than 84% indicating they search the online catalog, and 79% placing holds compared to 70 % in the 2014 survey.

Responses to questions about the collection were positive: 64% of respondents indicated that the Adult book, audiobook and music collections were good or excellent compared to only 12% who indicated they need improvement. 44% reported that the young adult book collection is good or excellent and 51 % reported that the Children's book collection is good or excellent. 57 to 61% reported that programs for adults and children were good or excellent.

When asked about the building and facilities, responses were similar to those in 2014. The building and grounds are clean and well cared for, but that the ease of use for people with disabilities, the availability of work space, seating, and computers all need improvement. Respondents were given the opportunity to comment on several questions and the comments were generally quite positive. Less discord about the votes on the debt-exclusion override for the local match for the provisional construction grant (FY2012) from the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners was expressed, as well as much hopefulness for a future effort to create a new library.

The Library is one of six pilot libraries in an Institute of Museum and Library Services grant called Empowering Public Libraries to be Science Literacy Centers. Some science related questions were asked to gauge community interest in science topics. 56 to 75% of respondents expressed that science related programs, activities and materials are important or very important. Respondents expressed an interest in many different science topics, with food, nutrition, exercise, gardens, forests, and sustainability receiving the most attention.

Budget

The total operating budget for fiscal year 2016 was \$86,894. Annual Town Meeting appropriated \$68,279. Other town-appropriated funds included \$47 from the revolving fund. Additional funding was provided by the Spear Expendable Trust, The Friends of the M.N. Spear Memorial Library, grants from the Local Cultural Council, State Aide to Public Libraries, and the Community Network for Children and the Council on Aging.

FY16 Annual Report – Water Resources Committee

FY2016 represented the second year of data collection from the eight water level monitoring wells that were installed at strategic locations in the town in September 2014. Data loggers collected and stored water level data on a regular basis, 24 hours a day, and that data was downloaded and analyzed on a quarterly basis. The results were summarized at the Spring 2016 Annual Town Meeting, and showed that water levels in the deep "bedrock" wells were robust, with normal seasonal variation, but no indication of a trend towards dropping levels over time. During the year, data loggers were also installed at two stream locations to start collecting baseline data on "conductivity" (which can indicate the presence of road salt and other compounds). It is too early to determine if any trends or correlations exist in that data. A town resident generously offered to update and expand the WRC website, so data collected by the committee will soon be available to interested parties.

Other issues the committee discussed, or is planning to explore further, include impacts from road salts, instituting a program to encourage residents to more regularly test the quality of their drinking water wells, movement and modeling of nitrates in groundwater, and the water quality of Lake Wyola.

Changes in committee membership during the year included the replacement of former selectperson April Stein with new selectperson Melissa Makepeace O'Neil, and Tim Cook taking over the chairman role from Paul Lyons.

Shutesbury Zoning Board of Appeals FY16 Annual Report

The Zoning Board of Appeals held ten meetings during FY16. The content of those meetings included public hearings for: one Special Permit/Variance application for setback encroachment, one Special Permit for setback requirements/non-habitable structure, Appeal of a Building Commissioner enforcement action, and one Special Permit to raise height and extend existing footprint. One consolidated application for setback encroachment Variance and Site Plan Review for an Accessory Apartment was continued into FY17.

Work to update the ZBA webpage was begun and will continue into FY17. Education and guidance is an ongoing feature of the Board's commitment to property owners.
