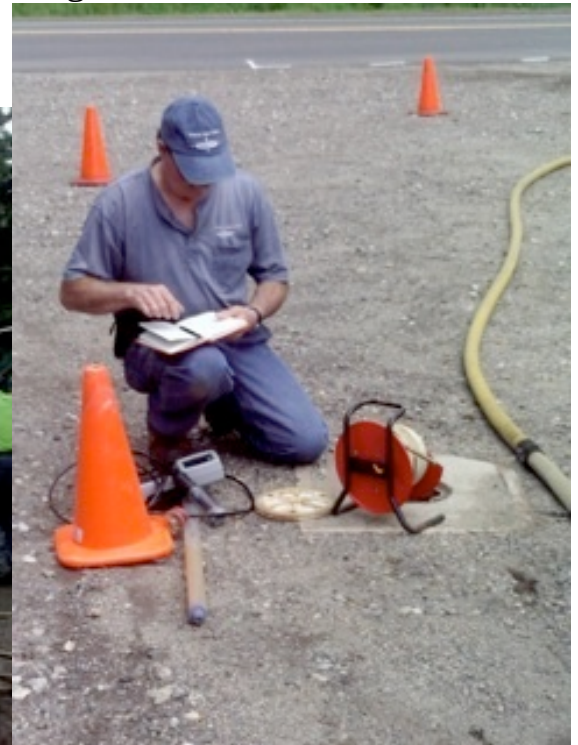


TA Report 6.28.12

THE FIRE STATION ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION INJECTION TOOK PLACE ON Thursday June 14, 2012. O'Reilly Talbot and Okun (OTO) teamed with Redox Tech to implement an innovative cleanup of the gasoline remaining under the fire station floor.



Three hundred gallons of a sodium persulfate/calcium peroxide solution were prepared on-site and injected at four points through the Shutesbury fire station floor. Test wells around the station were monitored during the process and air quality in the building was also tested. Water tests were taken prior to the injection to establish a baseline for comparison to future measurements. The injected chemicals become dissolved in groundwater and react with the gasoline contamination causing it to break down. The persulfate and the peroxide stimulate the naturally occurring bacteria making it easier for them to contribute to the gasoline's degradation. The persulfate acts more quickly, and there is longer term benefit from the calcium peroxide. During the injection, the scientists monitor three things: changes in conductivity, temperature and pH. John Henry said what they would see in the wells is a rise in pH which was neutral (close to 7) when prior to the injection. They also expected to see a rise in conductivity because the chemicals increase the groundwater's ability to conduct electricity. They used 2000 pounds of the sodium persulfate and calcium peroxide mixture. According to the OTO Redox team, the injected material has a long active half life of 3-4 months. This is a big improvement on straight hydroperoxide (which they have used at other locations) that only has an active half life of 3-4 days. In 4-8 months they expect to still have active oxidation taking place and then in 8-12 months they expect it will change to anaerobic biodegradation (that is degradation in the absence of oxygen). Sulfate based anaerobic reduction can continue for up to 2 years. The chemicals remain active even as the ground water table moves up and down, through seasonal fluctuations. This process helps to carry the active chemicals into the smear zone where the highest gasoline concentrations are likely to be. With this method up to 80% of the theoretical

reduction can occur in first month, but every situation is different. OTO technicians returned the following Monday to do ground water, water faucet and wetland tests. The results were all good. So far the injection is working as planned And OTO will continue monitoring for the next 5 quarters. They are hoping to see a significant improvement by the end of the first quarter.
